A5 Class Report



I have really enjoyed Work Place Learning at Foodbank. I am learning lots of new skills.



Community Work Crew

The community Work Crew have work as a team both onsite and off-site to complete task and manual labour to assist with restoring garden furniture and beautifying different environments at places like Camp Quaranup, the Community Gardens and here at Albany Secondary Education Support Centre.

Out at Camp Quaranup some task that the Community Work Crew undertook were moving and stacked firewood for the large groups that camp out at Camp Quaranup so they could like a fire at night to keep warm. They have assisted with maintaining bushes and shrubs on the road and walk trails around the area. They assisted the Camp Quaranup staff to beautify the grounds and get ready for the Camp Quaranup open day that was held in the October school holidays by weeding, preparing a large garden bed for planting, mulching large garden areas, restoring garden furniture and maintaining a walkway to be safe for visitors. These have all been great learning experiences for the crew to learn how to use power tools, manutention (safe lifting) techniques, teamwork, good work ethic and different skills that can be used to complete different tasks.

At the Community Gardens the crew have maintained the lawns by lawn mowing, edging the grass, turning the mulch and lots of weeding. They have completed a mammoth task of sanding back, painting and installing a gazebo that belongs to the Community Gardens which look great in its new home at the garden.

Over the year the crew have worked together in both large and small groups to complete tasks that have been set for them. They have used power tools that they may not have used before which allows them to gain new life skills and worked as a team to improve their communication and teamwork. It has been great to work with this group of students and watch them learn new skills and more efficient ways to complete tasks.

WA Meningococcal W Immunisation program.

The 2020 WA Meningococcal W Immunisation program will be offered at your school by the local School Health Immunisation nurses.

These vaccinations will be offered free to all year 10 students commencing term 2. Consent forms will be sent to your child school for distribution.

The Meningococcal W Immunisation program has been launched in response to the increase in meningococcal W infection. Some of the highest rates of meningococcal carriage and illness occur among 15-19 year olds. Once infected, this age group can transmit bacteria to people who are at an increased risk of infection, including young children. It is expected that providing the meningococcal W (Men W) vaccine to this group will reduce the spread of this potentially life threatening infection within the WA community.

Parents/legal guardians are asked to complete and sign the consent forms and return them to the school. Please return form whether you consent or do not consent to your child receiving the vaccination.

If you do not receive a vaccination consent form from your child, please ask at the school office for one.

If you have any queries regarding the program please contact Sally Moir- School Based Immunisation Coordinator on 9842 7526.

Vaccinations will also be available through our community based Immunisation clinic at Warden Avenue. Phone 9892 2499 for an appointment.

Handicamp is a live-in camp for 18-35 year old people with a disability, who are teamed with a "buddy" for a week of fun and adventure. It is held in January each year.

Bookings are required. The dinner cost will be advised nearer to the date (the previous 2 years the cost has been \$30 per person). The dinner is a wonderful opportunity to see how important and life changing Handicamp is for both the Campers and their Buddies.
