**Dear Parents and Carers**

In Maths, students have been focusing on percentage discounts. The students have been finding an range of percentages of amounts. Another area of Maths covered has been introducing probability. We have been thinking about different situations and describing them in terms of probability. We have learned how to describe probability in fractions and show them on number lines.







In English we have been continuing with our creative writing. This term it has been based on abandoned places. Students have been writing non fiction reports by researching some amazing example locations, while others have been using them as settings for creepy stories. Some members of our class have been using the new Colourful Semantics files to structure sentences and write independently. # A9 Class Report



Kynon has continued to have success at TAFE; developing his skills in growing plants, weeding and lawn mowing.














# AII Class Report







Weed Eradication. ### WA Meningococcal W Immunisation program

The 2020 WA Meningococcal W Immunisation program will be offered at your school by the local School Health Immunisation nurses.

These vaccinations will be offered free to all year 10 students commencing term 2. Consent forms will be sent to your child school for distribution.

The Meningococcal W Immunisation program has been launched in response to the increase in meningococcal W infection. Some of the highest rates of meningococcal carriage and illness occur among 15 -19 year olds. Once infected, this age group can transmit bacteria to people who are at an increased risk of infection, including young children. It is expected that providing the meningococcal W (Men W) vaccine to this group will reduce the spread of this potentially life threatening infection within the WA community.

Parents/legal guardians are asked to complete and sign the consent forms and return them to the school. Please return form whether you consent or do not consent to your child receiving the vaccination.

If you do not receive a vaccination consent form from your child, please ask at the school office for

#### **DENTAL THERAPY CENTRE UPDATE**

The Spencer Park Dental Therapy Centre is currently working under level 2 Government restrictions which mean we are now able to perform a wider range of treatments but are still restricted in some cases. We are in the process of calling parents with children who have urgent treatment. If you need to make your child an appointment for urgent care we ask that you please call our surgery, do not attend in person. When you attend your appointment only one visitor will be permitted inside the building this includes infants and siblings. Please make arrangements with your child's school prior to the appointment date and they can notify you of protocols for collection and return to school. If you or your child have been travelling outside of WA in the past 14 days OR been in contact with a confirmed COVID case OR are sick in anyway then please reschedule your child's appointment.

Your child is eligible with the School Dental Service until they are 17 OR the end of year 11. If you haven't been seen for a while or would like to enrol your child in our service you are welcome to contact us. Parents of enrolled students are reminded to contact the centre to update your details if you have moved or changed phone numbers in the last few years, without any way of contacting you your child could miss out on their dental visit. If you no longer intend to use our service please let us know as soon as possible as your valuable appointment could be taken by someone in need.
