
In Maths, over the last few weeks, we have been problem solving in Number and Algebra; working on the order of operations in tricky number sentences. The students have been following the necessary steps to ensure they calculate the different parts of the number sentences in the correct order. We have also been reinforcing our understanding of money. Chad and Tyler have worked very hard to identify coins and notes before using their addition and subtraction knowledge to answer real life problems.



In English, students have been learning about the three types of sentences (simple, compound and complex). We have been spotting and correcting mistakes in sentences and collecting conjunctions such as so, as, and whatsoever to use in our writing. The Colourful Semantics resources have continued to be used to great success. The students confidence and enjoyment in their writing has improved significantly as a result.

In our Podcast work we are close to the point of recording our own radio plays. The students have adapted fairy tale play scripts to appeal to a teenage audience, many of which have used comedy as a way to capture the attention of a more mature audience. These will be performed by the students before being edited using software to incorporate sound effects.

In Business, our company 'ASESC Rec Collection' have been reaching out to local businesses to ask for support in our recycling program. We have designed the business logo and been hard at work making fund raising posters and thermometer displays to keep track of our profits.







In Social Preparation lessons the students have been thinking about telephone etiquette. They have been writing scripts to make business related telephone calls and recording professional voicemail messages. To practice telephone manner the students have been using the school internal lines to role play difficult and often stressful work related phone conversations such as placing orders, dealing with customer complaints and booking appointments. They have all taken these difficult tasks in their stride. Great work by all.

Well done everyone on an amazing Term 3. Have a well deserved break.



Healthy ham and egg pies

Perfect for breakfast, lunch or dinner these wonderful healthy ham and egg pies are delicious. Eat them hot with a salad or cold out of a lunchbox.

Ingredients

oil spray

3 large slices lean ham (75g)

4 eggs, lightly beaten

2 tbsp milk

3 spring onions (shallots), finely chopped

1/2 cup canned creamed corn or corn kernels

1 tbsp chopped basil

1/2 cup (40g) grated low fat tasty cheese

salt and pepper

Method

Heat oven to 200°C (180°C fan-forced) and spray 6 cups of a muffin tray.

Line each cup with ham and set aside.

Whisk eggs with milk, spring onions, corn, basil and grated cheese. Season with salt and pepper.

Divide mixture among the 6 cups and bake for 25-30 minutes until pies are set in the middle.

Remove from oven, run a blunt knife around the edge to loosen and allow pies to sit in the tray for 5 minutes.

Remove pies from the muffin tray and enjoy with a salad.

Shared paths and footpaths

There are some special rules for the use of shared paths and footpaths in WA. Shared paths and footpaths are paths that are designated for shared use by cyclists and pedestrians. These rules include:

- All cyclists, regardless of their age, may ride on any footpath unless a 'no bicycles sign' has been erected.
- Riders must keep left on shared paths and footpaths unless overtaking.
- Riders must give way to pedestrians at all times (pedestrians include people walking, using motorised and non-motorised wheelchairs, and people on rollerblades and skates).
- At shared path intersections, you must signal your intention to turn and give way to motor vehicles entering or exiting an intersecting road.
- Riders must travel in single file on all paths, though they can travel two abreast on a road.
- Riders must not ride carelessly or recklessly. Riding recklessly includes riding at a speed that places other riders and pedestrians at risk.
- Animals must not be tied to a moving bike.
