The students made progress socially too, communicating to their peers and staff more often, and becoming more independent when completing tasks.

Indeed, this progress was highly evident at the class camp in Perth during Week Eight, a huge highlight of the year for both students and staff. The students were provided with several learning opportunities to assist their transition into the community by experiencing an urban Central Business District, to use trains and buses safely, and to use a tenting experience to increase their ability to work co-operatively and as part of a team. They thoroughly enjoyed the activities provided to them including swimming at the pool at Karrinyup Waters, and visiting Rottnest, where they cycled around the island, swam at the beach and met some of the resident quokkas. The students enjoyed the opportunity to visit Perth on Thursday, particularly the chance to go to level fifty of Central Park to witness a 360-degree view of the city, and a visit to Scitech where they learnt about several constellations in the night sky, and how our everyday behaviours are affecting the Earth in the presentation 'Earth Matters'. The trip was completed with a late night shopping visit to the Lakeside Shopping Centre in Joondalup, and the students can be commended for the exemplary way which they conducted themselves over the four days. It has been a fantastic year in A8! All members of the class have shown great maturity, tenacity and flexibility during a difficult year.



<u>Maths</u>

In Maths, there has been a big focus on areas of the subject with real life applications. For this reason we have spent lots of time learning about time including reading time tables, converting time and answering time related word problems. We have also worked hard at improving our understanding of money. This subject area included work on adding and subtracting money, percentage discounts, banking (cards, debt and interest), and paying tax. The students have worked on these areas with lots of enthusiasm and discussed difficult ideas. The class have also completed fantastic work around the four operations (add, subtract, multiply and divide) and geometry including perimeter.








English

In English, the class have worked hard developing sentence structures and have written vivid descriptions in stories. Colourful Semantics resources have been used to support students in their independent sentence writing and have proved extremely effective in building confidence. The class also wrote recipes before following each others recipes to make meals such as pancakes.



Reading has been the focus during weekly sessions both at the library and online using Reading A-Z e-book software. The students will continue to have full access to a huge range of texts, linked quizzes and activities during the summer break for them to continue reading at home.





The class have been developing their word processing skills across all the subjects this year. On top of this they have also been learning about how to stay safe when using the internet and protect themselves from fraudulent activity online. The main focus this year in computing has been learning how to write code using Minecraft Education. This fun problem solving work has allowed students to change the rules, appearance and physics of the game.

Physical Education

A8 have become considerate and safe cyclists over the year. All members have worked hard at either improving their balance to become confident on two wheels, or building on their existing skills to improve fitness each week. The class have ridden on the oval, road and around the bush track. They have demonstrated how to carry out pre-ride safety check, understand the importance of wearing safety gear and can plan rides using Google Maps. In the final weeks of Term 4, the class will be going on an excursion to ride between Emu Point and Middleton Beach. To put in to practice the skills and awareness they have been learning throughout the year.

2021 Year 7 Immunisation

Year 7 School Vaccination Pro-

gram.

The 2021 WA School Based Immunisation Program will be offered at your school by the local community school health immunisation nurses.

These vaccinations are offered free to all year 7 students.

A 2 dose course of Human Papilloma Virus (HPV) vaccine to be given in terms 1 and 4

One dose of diphtheria-tetanus-pertussis vaccine (whooping cough) given in term 1

These vaccines will be offered over 2 visits. Vaccination consent forms will be sent home with students early in term 1 2021. Parents/legal guardians are asked to complete and sign the forms and return them to the school. Even if you are not consenting to your child receiving the vaccines, please return the form.

If you do not receive a vaccination consent form for your child, please ask at the school office for one.

Please return all immunisation forms to school as soon as possible for checking.

If you have any queries regarding the immunisation program please contact me on 9842 7526.

If your child is not vaccinated at school they can come to our immunisation clinic at the Albany Health Campus. No cost is involved. Phone 9892 2499 for an appointment.
