# CI Class Report











The stories told around the table in regards to everyone's holidays were fantastic. Most pleasing were the efforts from all students in describing and retelling their favourite moments with limited assistance.






Students in C1 enjoy collecting recycling from around the school as well as researching and learning about the process of recycling and what new products can be made from recycled goods.


All students have been lots earning of points on their ClassDojo and are very keen to see their progress.



### Communication Myths

#### Myths regarding AAC - MythBusters

The persistence of these beliefs/myths are not only wrong, but also harmful to those in the AAC community.

Myth	Research Shows	
AAC stops or hinders speech development.	This is an interesting myth but from a natural concerned parents have for their child. The truth is that the AAC is linked to an increased chance of verbal speech improving and developing (Miller, 2000.Romski, 2005).  AAC can improve speech development.  AAC reduces the cognitive and motor demands during communication which may facilitate future speech production.  Individuals can utilise AAC and speech as a multimodal communication system.	
There is a representational hierarchy of symbols from objects to words.		
Children must have a certain set of skills to be able to benefit from AAC. His/her cognitive skills are too low to learn to use as AAC. The individual has the cognitive skills of nine-month the old. That system is for "higher functioning kids".	These statements are the demeaning, and I have heard people make comments like this in front of the student. If the individual is not able to communicate at the same level as peers, his/her communication difficulties may be interfering with his/her ability to access accurately express intelligence.	
	Low-tech devices may not work for individuals who have complex bodies as the physical demands are too high.	
Hitech AAC is better than low-tech AAC.	There is no best type of AAC. Each system has its pros and cons depends on the person's preferences.	
People who can express basic needs do not need AAC.	Everyone has the right to communicate to their greatest ability, not just to express their basic needs.  Specific populations (those with aphasia or in autism) benefit from you utilising AAC and speech to create a multimodal system.	
People with communication impairments cannot learn literacy.	Individuals with communication impairments are able to learn literacy skills so they can read and write.  Explicit teaching literacy schools is effective for all children, including those with communication impairments.  Literacy skills are more dependent on exposure, modelling, and access than cognitive abilities.	
We have to get his/her behaviour is under control and we can consider communication.	If the individual does not have a reliable, effective way to communicate, he/she has no choice but to use behaviours. Appropriate, functional, comprehensive communication is necessary for "appropriate behaviour".
