Students have embraced the return of swimming and it is a joy to welcome and see Monty participating whilst growing in confidence every week.




C3 Class Report

Certificate II in Business & the Coffee Enterprise



Throughout the year we have been working hard to finish the Certificate II in Business. This comprised of over 300 hours of learning to complete 12 units and 91 hours practical experience in our log books. To help us achieve this we created our own business enterprise, making and selling coffees and hot chocolates to the staff. We called our coffee enterprise The Barista Buddy's.

We have completed a lot of work in Certificate II Business and learnt to perform many tasks such as emailing, printing, laminating resources, scanning documents, binding, Excel book keeping and banking.

The coffee enterprise has taught us how to work effectively as a team, provide customer service, understand profit and loss, budgeting and banking.

We created and sent out surveys to gain customer feedback on the use of reusable cups and then created a business plan to encourage customers to use them.

On Mondays and Thursdays we do Certificate II Business with Dawn. We run an enterprise selling coffee every Thursday to the staff to teach us how to run a business and to make money. As part of the course we have to do a lot of paper work and computer work to complete the certificate. My favourite thing was making and delivering the coffees. PEERS Social Skills Groups For Adolescents

PEERS for Adolescents is a 14-week evidence-based social skills intervention for teens in middle and high school who are interested in learning new ways of making and keeping friends. This internationally acclaimed program, used in over 35 countries, was originally developed at the University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA) by Dr. Elizabeth Laugeson. During each group session, teens are taught important social skills and are given the opportunity to practice these skills in session during socialisation activities. Parents or caregivers (when available) attend separate sessions at the same time and are taught how to assist their teens in making and keeping friends by helping to expand their teen's social network and providing feedback through coaching. PEERS has proven effective for teens with Autism Spectrum Disorder, ADHD, Anxiety, Depression or other social and behavioural disorders. Group participation is preferred, however program can be delivered one-to-one.



Participants will learn how to:

- Use appropriate conversational skills
- Use humour appropriately
- Enter and exit conversations
- Be a good host during get-togethers
- · Be a good sport

- · Handle arguments and disagreements
- Change a bad reputation
- · Handle rumours and gossip
- Handle rejection, teasing and bullying
- Use electronic communication
